VITAL RECORDS OF DOVER-FOXCROFT, MAINE

Compiled by John F. Battick and Nancy Klimavicz Battick

The area that became the town of Dover was first surveyed in 1791 by the Committee for the Sale of Eastern Lands of Massachusetts. The first settler, generally believed to be Eli Towne, came to the area with his family in 1799 and was soon joined by other settlers from New Hampshire and southwestern Maine. The community was first known as Plantation #3 in 1812 and incorporated as the town of Dover in 1822. Dover became the shire town of Piscataquis County when it was formed in 1838.

North of Dover, Foxcroft was one of the six communities deeded from Massachusetts to Bowdoin College in 1794. The town's first settlers in 1806 were members of the Spaulding family and the town was incorporated in 1812, named for Joseph Ellery Foxcroft, its proprietor. In their heydays, Dover and Foxcroft were both major manufacturing and employment centers for the southern Piscataquis County area. The towns shared a common residential and commercial area along the Piscataquis River. The concept of unification into one community was raised at several points in the 19th and early 20th centuries, but did not finally occur until 1922.

Fortunately for genealogists and historians, both communities kept numerous town and vital records from their earliest incorporations and none are missing, though their physical conditions vary greatly. This three-volume set contains all of the vital records recorded in both towns, with Volume 1 including all of the vital records recorded in Dover and Volume 2 containing all of the vital records recorded in Foxcroft. The Dover records are found in ten books, covering births and deaths from as early as 1753 and marriage and marriage intentions from 1813. The Foxcroft records are found in twelve books and include births and deaths extending as far back as 1741 and marriages and marriage intentions starting in 1814. The size of the index, with 61,300 entries, speaks clearly to the vast amount of information found in this set.

John and Nancy Battick, current and the former Presidents of the Maine Genealogical Society, spent years painstakingly copying all of records for the town where they reside. Never before published in their entirety, the records in this new resource promises to be a boon for genealogists with families in Piscataquis County.

ANOTHER MRS. SILAS HALL:
LUCY (RANDALL) (MILLER) (MARSHALL) HALL
AND HER FAMILY

The life of Rev. Silas Hall (1794–1877) swirled in public and private controversy. He arose from obscurity to become entangled in the Millerite controversies of the 1840s, which affixed a specific date for the Second Coming of Christ. His preaching brought rancor. After a brief career as a Baptist minister in the pulpits of Long Island, New York, Block Island, Rhode Island, and Canterbury, Connecticut, he seemed to disappear after his enumeration in the 1850 census for New York City until his reemergence in December 1870, when he officiated a marriage in Tremont, Maine. Soon afterwards, Silas reestablished old contacts in Maine to corroborate the documentation needed for him to obtain a War of 1812 survivor's pension. Likewise, as a resident of Portland in 1871, he not only supplied highly selective biographical information for Joseph B. Hall's compilation, *The Descendants of Hatevil Hall*, he also lied outright that his wife, Bethiah (Phinney) Hall, the mother of his twelve children, had died in 1852.¹ Given the upheavals in Silas's tumultuous ministry, as well as his itinerancy and prevarications, it seemed plausible for me to speculate that, since he could not be found in either the 1860 or 1870 censuses, Silas had a secret to conceal.

As my *re*-search continued to account for the missing years in Silas Hall's life, I needed to do exactly that, to search again, with fewer preconceptions, and to go over previous finds. One such example was a head of household from the Massachusetts 1865 State Census. Having once noted that there was a Silas Hall, aged 72 and born in Maine, living in Wilmington, Massachusetts, I thought, at that time, it was an unlikely match because this Silas was enumerated with a "housewife," Lucy Hall, aged 59 and born in Maine, plus four other people in the household each with different surnames.² That profile was at odds with the knowledge of the 1860 census enumeration which had Silas's wife Bethiah Hall living in Providence, Rhode Island, with two of their sons, Ariel and George Hall, and a granddaughter Adaline Downs.³ Nonetheless, a second and more probing examination of the 1865 census record revealed that Silas was indeed a "Baptist clergyman." Was it then possible that "housewife" Lucy Hall was another wife?

LUCY, HER HUSBANDS, AND HER CHILDREN

The Wilmington, Massachusetts, vital records provided that answer in the details of the marriage of Rev. Silas Hall, D.D., and Lucy Marshall on 6 May 1858, the entry revealing it was his second marriage, her third. Silas's birthplace of Poland, Maine, and the names of his parents, Job and Mary Hall, are given. Evidently, the performing minister, Rev. Samuel H. Tolman, took Silas at his word that he was a Doctor of Divinity.⁴ No parents were cited for Lucy, although her birthplace was listed as Eliot, Maine.⁵ With such definitive proof of this bigamous marriage,⁶ it begged the question of how I could have missed Silas in the indexes for the 1860 census. A search in the 1860 census for Wilmington produced no *Silas* Hall. However, by looking alternatively under Lucy Hall's name, this household came to light:⁷

Cyrus Hall, 66, clergyman, b. Maine
 Lucy Hall, 55, b. Maine
 Emma Marshall, 16, b. Mass.
 Lucy Somers, age 12, b. Mass.

That subtle change in the first name might be attributed to an imprecise census taker, but the same duplicity occurs in the 1870 census for Wilmington, when Silas appears under the name *Cyrus Fall*, occupation *farmer*.⁸ The household shows:

Cyrus Fall, 76, farmer, b. Maine
 Lucy Fall, 67, housekeeper, b. Maine
 Emma A. Marshall, 25, b. Mass.
 Nathaniel Eckerman, 7, b. Mass.

Additional details from the 1870 agricultural census give us a snapshot of the economic plight of this family unit. Of all the farming households enumerated in Wilmington, the value of this ten-acre rented farm was the low at \$800.00, compared to a high of \$7,000.00. There were no livestock; in the previous year, twenty bushels of potatoes and five tons of hay were produced.⁹ Given the ages of *Cyrus* and *Lucy*, they certainly needed the extra pair of hands that young Nathaniel provided to help with farm chores. The name changes in these censuses did indeed achieve their deceptive purpose because they were successful in putting me off the trail for many

years. Ironically, Silas Hall lived in Wilmington with Lucy for a dozen years, longer than any other location during his adult life, and only 75 miles away from daughters in Fairhaven, Massachusetts. Then he exited just as abruptly when he moved back to Maine at the end of 1870. Silas Hall's entry in *The Descendants of Hatevil Hall* makes no mention at all of his Wilmington years.¹⁰ Furthermore, there is no record of a divorce from Lucy,¹¹ so when Silas married the twice-widowed Hannah Barton in Thomaston, Maine, on 25 January 1872, he committed bigamy once again. Ironically, at the time of Silas's death on 13 November 1877, each of the three Maine-born women who had married him—Bethiah Phinney, Lucy Marshall, and Hannah Barton—all survived, but only Hannah collected the War of 1812 widow's pension.

Answering the riddle of Silas's missing years raised for me another series of compelling questions: Who was Lucy, his second wife? Where did she come from? How long had she lived in Massachusetts? Who were the various people in her household? Since information about Lucy's parentage was not given when she married Silas Hall, it seemed expedient to seek her death certificate in the hope it would name her parents. Because she could not be found on the 1880 census, it was logical to search for her death before that date. In fact, Lucy lived on until 15 February 1884 when she died in Boston at the age of 87.¹² Lucy Hall's record of death included her birthplace, given as Kittery, Maine, and the names and birthplaces of her parents, Edward Randall, born Isle of Shoals, and Sarah (—), born Kittery.¹³ That level of detail implied a family member, knowledgeable about Lucy's forebears, acted as the informant. With the exception of the 1880 census, much could be learned about Lucy through her enumeration in three federal (1850, 1860, 1870) and two state (Massachusetts 1855, 1865) censuses. Each of these censuses shows complex, multi-generational households of people with different surnames. The challenge lay in separating possible family members from boarders.

Working backward from Lucy Marshall's 1858 marriage to Silas Hall, the 1855 Massachusetts State Census for Wilmington showed Lucy living with her second husband's family, abstracted as follows:¹⁴

 John Marshall, 48, b. Boston, cooper
 Lucy Marshall, 49, b. Elliot, Maine
 Emma A. Marshall, 12, b. Boston
 John Langley, 33, b. N.J.
 Daniel Connell, 14, b. Ireland

Only two other events were recorded in the Wilmington vital records under the surname *Marshall*, and both entries pertained to this family. The first was the death of Lucy's husband, John Marshall, on 15 April 1856,¹⁵ followed by the death of his father, John Marshall, just three years later, on 1 July 1859.¹⁶ Twelve-year-old Emma was John and Lucy's daughter, and John Langley and Daniel O'Connell evidently were boarders. Within this census household, there was no evidence of any earlier marriage for Lucy or children other than Emma Marshall.

Continuing to work in reverse to the 1850 census, the Marshalls lived in Boston, with Lucy's husband, John Marshall, as the head of household.¹⁷ Lucy was among many Maine-born residents of New England's largest city. Of the 137,119 individuals enumerated in Boston in that census, 8,231 cited Maine as their birthplace. Although the census gives only ward divisions and no street listings, it is possible to corroborate data with Boston directories from the late 1830s, which record that John Marshall Jr. lived at four different addresses prior to the 1850 census.¹⁸ His various occupations, ranging from hardcartman, job wagon, to cooper, were undoubtedly plied at the waterfront. From the 1850 Boston Directory, John Marshall Jr. worked at and resided at 336 Hanover Street. The 1850 census entry shows an extended household of eleven persons, and the variety of perhaps six different surnames once again indicated the Marshalls took in boarders:

Emily ("Emma") A. Marshall, Lucy's daughter, was the sixth person listed in the household, but who were the third and fourth persons and did they represent two surnames or, in fact, just one? The handwriting certainly looks like people of two

different names. Yet why would these people be inserted between Lucy and her daughter Emma? Was the third person, Mary J. *Jones*, perhaps Lucy's daughter by her first husband? Or was she Mary J. *Somes*, perhaps the wife of John S. *Somes*, the fourth person listed and mother of the two-year-old Lucy A., the fifth person listed in the household? After 75-year-old "Jno" Marshall, Lucy's father-in-law and the seventh person listed, the remaining names—John Langley, Jacob and Catherine Maine, and Edward Monroe—all proved to be boarders.¹⁹

Before speculating further, it seemed necessary to find when Lucy married John Marshall as her second husband, and that of course, would require knowing what her name was after her first marriage. I decided to focus next on the life of Lucy's youngest child, Emma Marshall, to see if she would yield any clues to other siblings. Emma married Horace Caswell in Wilmington on 14 November 1872 and lived until 5 April 1915.²⁰ Emma (Marshall) Caswell's death certificate, with her husband as the informant, had a curious piece of information. As expected, it stated that Emma's father was John Marshall, but her mother, born in Maine, was Lucy *Miller*, not Randall. Contemplating that Horace Caswell might not have known his mother-in-law's true maiden name, he might have given the surname of Lucy's first husband, which would have been her surname when she married Emma's father, John Marshall. With this hypothesis in mind, I searched for a marriage of a John Marshall and Lucy Miller and found it in Boston, having taken place on 24 July 1834.²¹ Thus, as a widow in her mid thirties, Lucy was living in Boston, when she married John Marshall, but where and when did she marry her first husband Miller? A search of Boston marriages for Lucy Randall with a Miller spouse revealed Lucy's first marriage to Philip Miller in Boston on 8 August 1822.²² The index of Boston births did not include any children born to Philip and Lucy Miller for that time period, but through Family Search's advanced search option of typing in the names of both parents, Philip Miller and Lucy Randall, I found the 1902 death certificate of one of their children, Lucy Ann Miller, born in Boston in 1827.²³

Returning to the 1850 census family group, it seemed worthwhile to explore the hypothesis that Mary J. *Jones* was in fact Mary J. (Miller) *Somes*, wife of John *Somes* and mother of the two-year-old Lucy. Was young Lucy, born circa 1848, the same person as Lucy "Somers," the 12-year-old child living with Lucy and Silas in 1860 Wilmington census? Although Massachusetts began statewide registration of

vital statistics in 1841, many births, deaths, and marriages from that time period for the City of Boston are not part of the master index. There was no marriage found for John Somes to Mary Jane Miller, but their 1847 marriage intention is recorded in Boston city records.²⁴ Mary Jane and John Somes's absence as a couple from the 1860 census suggested that Mary Jane might have died prior to its enumeration.²⁵ Indeed, Mary Jane (Miller) Somes died of tuberculosis on 28 March 1860; her death certificate naming her parents as Philip Miller and Lucy Randall.²⁶ That explains why 12-year-old Lucy *Somers* was living with her grandmother and Silas Hall in Wilmington.²⁷ Neither Lucy Somes nor her father, John Somes, have been located in the 1865 Massachusetts census. At the time of the 1870 census, however, John Somes, still a widower and living in Boston, appeared as head of household with daughter Lucy, now married to Albert A. Randall.²⁸ Was it a coincidence that Lucy Somes now possessed the same surname that her grandmother did at birth? Exploring the answer to that question generated the likelihood of additional family ties.

RANDALL FAMILY OF ELIOT AND PORTSMOUTH

Having accounted for Lucy's first two husbands and her marriages in Boston, the early chapters of her life still needed to be constructed. With several sources citing Eliot (or Kittery) Maine as her birthplace and naming Edward and Sarah Randall as her parents, this became the starting point for documenting her childhood in Maine. Although I easily found the 1784 marriage of Edward Randall and Sarah Tucker in the Kittery vital records,²⁹ this couple proved elusive. Their children's births were not recorded in Kittery, nor were they landowners in York County. Even more surprisingly, Edward is not found as a head of household in the 1790 or 1800 censuses. In 1810, however, Edward *Randal* is found as a head of household in Eliot, enumerated directly before Abigail *Randal*, whom as will be shown was likely his mother.³⁰ He appears in no other censuses. His family's entry in 1810 has only three individuals in the household, but other evidence will be presented to show that there

were certainly more children. Given that Edward was married in 1784, it was logical to investigate whether he served in the American Revolution.

Edward Randall verifiably fought in the Revolutionary War, and two different sets of documents emerged in that context. First, there was a Revolutionary War bounty land warrant application claimed in his name. The June 1818 deposition shows that William Randell of Eliot was claiming bounty land on behalf of his father Edward Randall's service.³¹ Evidence in support of William's claim was sufficient to obtain the 100 acres of bounty land. After obtaining the claim, on 12 March 1819, William and his brother Noah "and the other heirs at law of Edward Randall" promptly sold their claim to a land speculator on 10 April 1819.³² It is worthwhile to note that William's claim makes no reference to his mother, nor does it mention he had a sister, and in the absence of the names of the heirs at law, one can only guess if they all received their share.

William Randall: In 1817 William married Patience Ricker in Eliot and evidently remained in Eliot where he was listed as a head of household in the 1820 and 1830 censuses and in 1840 in Kittery.³³ From the household numbers of these enumerations, it seems likely that William and Patience had at least three sons. Records, however, have not yet been found that explicitly state their names, but more circumstantial evidence will be presented that may reveal the identity of one. Adding to the complexity, William also lived in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, during the 1830s. He is found in the 1834 Portsmouth Directory and again, in 1839, when he was listed as a confectioner under the name of "Randall & Tripyear," working with widow Nancy Tripyear, house at 35 Court Street.³⁴ That is also the same year he married a second wife, Eliza Wiggin, in Portsmouth. William died in 1846 and in the 1850 census for Portsmouth Eliza Randell, with her three young children, were enumerated in the household of Dorothy Gerrish.³⁵ Eliza Randell's entry in the 1851 Portsmouth Directory shows her still running the confectioner business.³⁶ After the 1860 census, Eliza moved to Boston, where she died in 1864.³⁷

Noah Randall: Noah Randall also remained in Eliot, where he married Catherine Martin in 1826 and is listed as a head of household in 1830 and 1840.³⁸ Oddly, he is not found in the 1850 census. In 1860 Noah and his wife, Catherine, were

living in Eliot Depot, but within a few years they had moved to Portsmouth where Noah ran a tavern for the remaining years of his life.³⁹

Not only was Sarah (Tucker) Randall absent from any mention in the bounty land file, she is also missing from census records and any other known record until July 1838, when as a 78-year-old resident of Portsmouth, she applied for a Revolutionary War widow's pension.⁴⁰ A new set of documentary evidence supported her claim. Certainly the most interesting aspects of the pension file concern Sarah's testimony of her husband's service:

That said Edward Randell enlisted early in the war (but the year she is unable to state, as it was before she was acquainted with him). . . . He was in several battles and was wounded several times, first at the engagement at Monmouth on the 28th of June 1779 he was shot through the face, and afterwards shot through the left shoulder, and was wounded in the right arm, but never claimed a pension for his said wounds.⁴¹

George Fishley of Portsmouth, also a Revolutionary pensioner, corroborated all the essential details of Sarah's testimony. Included in the file are depositions from the Kittery Town Clerk with the details of Edward and Sarah's intention and marriage and the date of Edward's death, supplied by Sarah that he died on 23 December 1810.



Missing from the pension documents is any mention of Sarah and Edward's children. Even though Sarah is listed in the 1839 Portsmouth Directory at the same address as her son William, she is listed as head of household with only one other person in her household at the time of the 1840 census in Portsmouth; the census also notes that she was a Revolutionary War widow, aged 79.⁴² When she applied for additional pension benefits on 22 May 1843, William Randall witnessed Sarah's mark.⁴³ Sarah spent the remaining years of her life in Portsmouth, where her gravestone survives in North Cemetery. There is no evidence of other family members being interred in the same plot with her.⁴⁴

Examining Lucy Randall's family circumstances gives context as to why she left Maine. By the end of 1810, Lucy was without a father, and one begins to understand the probable disadvantaged conditions that propelled her to Boston while her mother and two brothers remained in Eliot or Portsmouth. Her father's absence in the 1790 and 1800 censuses, his lack of land ownership in York or Rockingham Counties, and his omission from probate records are all indicative of a poor family. Moreover, the presence of only one child in the 1810 census in Edward Randall's family may indicate his sons were already boarded out, probably working in and thereby enumerated as part of other households. One surprising fact emerged in searching Boston records for traces of Lucy and other family members. Edward Randall's death at age 52 was recorded in Boston, and he was interred in the North Burying Ground.⁴⁵ Furthermore, a later compilation of Boston deaths adds information from the newspaper *Columbian Centennial* that Edward died aboard the sloop *Mary* of Kittery.⁴⁶ Deducing thus that Edward was a mariner further explains why he was difficult to track.

ADDITIONAL RANDALL CHILDREN

At his death in 1810, Edward and Sarah had been married for more than twenty-five years, and childhood mortality notwithstanding, it seemed odd that there were only three surviving children: William, born about 1792; Lucy, born about 1797; and Noah born about 1800. The most obvious gap in births was from 1784, when Edward and Sarah were married, to around the time of William's birth. There was also a possibility of children born before Lucy or after Noah. Given the wider picture of a young woman moving from Maine to the hub of New England, it seemed unlikely that Lucy would settle in Boston without other family members. How could one search for other possible Randall siblings? Once again, the research template at Family Search proved enormously helpful. Entering the surname *Randall* and birthplace *Eliot, Maine*, yielded both the probability of an older brother, Dearborn, and the revelation of a younger sister, Sarah.

Dearborn Randall: Dearborn Randall, born about 1794, emerges as a viable son of Edward and Sarah Randall. His unusual first name carries an association with a surname common to the Portsmouth area, perhaps as well as a connection to Revolutionary War hero, Henry Dearborn. Dearborn Randall first appears as a resident of Dedham, Massachusetts, when he married his first wife, Cordelia Wight, in 1823, and then again two years later, when, as a widower, he remarried his wife's sister, Meltiah

Wight.⁴⁷ By 1830 he had moved to Norwich, later renamed Huntington, in Hampshire County, Massachusetts.⁴⁸ In both the 1850 Federal and 1855 Massachusetts state censuses, Maine is given as his birthplace.⁴⁹ When he died in 1856 from typhoid fever, his parents' names were not given on the death record, but his birthplace was given as Eliot, Maine.⁵⁰ There have been no other Randall families discovered living in Kittery or Eliot during the 1790s, and the path to Boston is validated through Edward Randall's death there. While there is no document naming him as the son of Edward and Sarah (Tucker) Randall, the fact that he named a son *Edward* and a daughter *Sarah* contributes to the circumstantial evidence. Furthermore, with Lucy Randall living in Boston in the early 1820s, Dearborn was in the vicinity at the time of his marriages.

Sarah Randall: From what the records disclose about Edward and Sarah's youngest child, Sarah Randall, who was born about 1805, her life story has many elements in common with her older sister Lucy. Living in Boston at the time of her marriage to Henry Augustus Huntington in 1831, she was destined for an early widowhood but did not remarry. Henry had enlisted as a soldier in the United States Army.⁵¹ That would possibly explain why he does not appear in census indexes nor in Boston or Charlestown directories. By 1843 Sarah Huntington was listed as a widow, and between 1846 and 1853 she is recorded at the same address, 18 Morton Street, occupation nurse.⁵² That location was within short walking distance of where Lucy and family lived near at the same time at 336 Hanover Street. In the 1850 census, Sarah, aged 45, was a head of household, living with her only surviving son, Charles W. Huntington, aged 14, and two boarders, Philip and George Cartwright.⁵³ Sarah's last Boston Directory entry corresponds to her death, from tuberculosis, on 28 January 1854.⁵⁴

Nancy Randall: Having accounted for what seemed to complete Edward and Sarah (Tucker) Randall's family, it still vexed me that there was a gap of about eight years from their marriage date in 1784 until the birth of their first child, William. If they had a daughter during those years, that daughter might have married in the period 1805–1810 in Kittery. It behooved me to examine Kittery records, and that

effort was rewarded in discovering the marriage of Nancy Rendal to Noah Hodsdon on 22 October 1805.⁵⁵ Not finding any further documentation on Noah Hodsdon, I next found the marriage of Nancy Hodsdon to Robert Tripure on 20 May 1808.⁵⁶ *Tripure*—*Tripyear*! And with that, one more piece of the puzzle fell into place. Nancy Rendal/Randall married Robert Tripure as her second husband. Now it made even greater sense why Nancy *Tripyear* would have gone into the confectionery business with William Randall and why their mother, Sarah, would have lived with them at 35 Court Street, Portsmouth, in 1839. Undoubtedly, Nancy would have been the woman between 40 and 50 living with Sarah Randall at the time of the 1840 census.⁵⁷ By the end of the decade, Nancy had moved to Amesbury, Massachusetts, where she died in April 1848, aged 64, from the bane of the Randall family—tuberculosis.⁵⁸ Amesbury would ultimately prove to be the location of yet another Randall sibling.

SHAKER ASSOCIATIONS

Deaths in the prime of life were the norm, not the exception within this family. When Lucy married her first husband, Philip Miller, he was already a widower with one surviving child, who died within a month of Philip and Lucy's marriage.⁵⁹ Little is known of Philip beyond his two entries in Boston directories, as well as later evidence that stated he was a seaman, born in Halifax, Nova Scotia. Arguably what must have been one of the most wrenching episodes Lucy experienced as a mother comes to life through documentation on her oldest known child, Lucy Ann Miller. The latter's death record from Canterbury, New Hampshire, cites Boston as her birthplace; however, she had been a resident of the Canterbury for seventy-one years. Census records and the archives of the Canterbury Shakers revealed that Lucy Miller, at the age of four, was placed with the Shaker community. No death record survives for Lucy Ann Miller's father, Philip, but her mother, Lucy (Randall) Miller, appears in the 1832 Bos-

ton Directory as a widow.⁶⁰ In the years of her first widowhood, Lucy may not have been able to support two children. As an act of faith, some single parents gave their children to be raised by the Shakers, knowing they would get much better care within their communities than they would living in poverty. It is not known if Mary Jane Miller, Lucy Ann's younger sister, was ever placed with the Shakers. While some children ultimately left, others became lifelong Shakers. The archives of the East Canterbury community further reveal that Lucy Ann Miller eventually became the Eldress of the "North Family" and functioned in that capacity from 1887 until her death in 1902.⁶¹ The choice that a parent like Lucy made for her child was not all that unusual in an era when thousands joined the Shakers. One wonders why Lucy selected the Canterbury community from among others. In fact, the answer may relate to her nephew, William Tripure, son of her sister Nancy, who had been adopted by this community in 1823 and rose to prominence, as this passage from August 1840 attests:

WILLIAM TRIPURE THE BOTANIST who has the personal charge of the Botanic Garden, and who at the same time practices physic in the Shaker families, the individuals of which seldom need medicine of any kind, was taken by the Shakers when very young, a poor boy from Elliot in the State of Maine. Probably there is not the second individual in the United States of his age who has so extensive a practical knowledge of botany as this young man. . . . The school is kept three months in winter for boys; the present schoolmaster for the boys is Dr. Tripure, the botanist, who carries one of the most pleasant and intelligent faces we have ever seen upon the head of mortal man.⁶²

Was it because of Nancy's successful choice of placing a child that Lucy was inspired to do the same? William became a well known Shaker spokesman, corresponding even with Henry Ward Beecher, but by 1844 he left the community "under trying circumstances" and soon married another ex-Canterbury Shaker.⁶³ William's subsequent actions earned him approbation within the Shaker community. He assembled a traveling road show, titled the Case Family, which "featured men and women who whirled around and carried on in outlandish manners that were advertised as genuine Shaker worship dances."⁶⁴ Following his brief theatrical career, William embarked on a migration path that took him and his family to Floyd County, Indiana. In the 1860 census, William gave his occupation as school teacher.⁶⁵ Later Indiana censuses list him as a farmer, more profitable than the former.⁶⁶ It is a twist of his-

tory that a man reared by a celibate community would have the greatest number of descendants today of all the other Randall descendants within this article.

Lydia Randall: Finding the 1853 marriage in Salisbury, Mass., of William's 37-year-old sister, Sarah Ann Tripure, to John Moulton provided the clues for the discovery of yet another daughter of Edward and Sarah Randall. Sarah Ann also may have been a member of the Canterbury Shakers, as interpolated from the following account given before the New Hampshire Legislature in November 1848:

I recollect only one case of insanity; that was a female by the name of Tripure; she was insane several months, but is now well; she was about twenty-five when she was insane.⁶⁷

Because Sarah Tripure married at a late age, locating her in the 1850 census might identify other family members. Sarah Tripure, aged 34, born Maine, lived in the household of Charles W. Hervey, a confectioner, in Exeter, New Hampshire.⁶⁸ Charles's wife, Eliza, aged 38, was also born in Maine, so perhaps she was Sarah's sister. On her marriage record, however, she proved to be née Eliza Lunt.⁶⁹ Following up on possible Lunt siblings of Eliza, I found in a strange twist that a Roselie Lunt married John Moulton as his third wife.⁷⁰ Roselie's death certificate in 1908 tied all these relationships together. It listed Roselie's parents as John and Lydia (Randall) Lunt, the informant being one Francis "Prevaux."⁷¹ This harkened back to the record of an 1821 marriage in Portsmouth I had found of Lydia Lunt to John "Prevou," undoubtedly Lydia (Randall) Lunt's second marriage. John Prevaux, born about 1784, an immigrant from France and a War of 1812 soldier, was a confectioner. Perhaps he is the one who introduced the trade to the Randall family. Fortunately, Lydia lived the longest of anyone in her generation. At the time of the 1870 census, at the age of 83, she was still listed as a confectioner with her widowed daughter Susan Arnold keeping house.⁷² When she died in 1876, at age 89, her death certificate named her place of birth of Eliot and her parents as Edward and Sarah (Tucker) Randall.⁷³ It turned out that her youngest child, Francis Edward Prevaux, also achieved religious prominence. His well documented career took him to California as a Baptist missionary at the time of the Gold Rush. This tribute was published in the Baptist Encyclopedia:

... He received an appointment from the American Baptist Home Missionary Society to go to California as a missionary to the new settlements of that State. He not only preached but engaged also in the work of teaching. Although his connection with the Home Missionary Society was not of long continuance, he remained in the vocation to which he deemed himself called by the voice of Providence. Ten years were devoted to his work, when the disease which terminated fatally compelled him to return to his Eastern friends in Salisbury, Mass., where he died May 12, 1860.⁷⁴

POSSIBLY MORE FAMILY LINKS

From the clues left to us after a century and a half, one can only surmise the extent to which other intricate networks of kinship played out even closer to Lucy. Additional cross-referencing the household of John Marshall in the Boston city directories during the 1840s revealed another conjectural Randall family relationship. When in 1845 John Marshall resided at 70 Friend Street, William A. and Augustus Randall also lived at that same address. The following year, John Marshall moved to 11 Lynde Street, where he was listed in the directories for 1846 and 1847. William A. Marshall, but not Augustus, is also found for those two years at the Lynde Street address, but by 1848 William disappears from the record.⁷⁵ It is possible but remains unproven that this William A. Randall, listed in Boston directories as a hairdresser and a barber from 1841 to 1847, could have been a son of Lucy's brother, William, and his first wife, Patience Ricker. William A. Randall might possibly be the son born before 1820. He first appears in Boston when he married Martha Hillet on 5 May 1840.⁷⁶ Having shared two addresses with Lucy and John Marshall, it seems more than a coincidence that William A.'s son, Albert A. Randall, born in 1842, married Lucy Somes in 1868.⁷⁷ Certainly Albert would have known Lucy Somes in infancy, but were they also second cousins? What is known is that by 1850, Albert Randall, aged 8, was living with dozens of other children at Boston's Ladies Home Education Society.⁷⁸ In the 1855 Massachusetts census, Albert, aged 13, was enumerated, as a pauper, in Boston city institutions,⁷⁹ and in 1860, he was a farmhand in the household of Robert B. Brown of Dorchester.⁸⁰ His mother, Martha, has not been located in the 1850 census, but in 1860 she was living

in the household of Ira Hiland and working as a domestic.⁸¹ When Albert enlisted at the beginning of the Civil War in Company K of the First Massachusetts Regiment, he indicated that he contributed towards the support of his mother, another indicator that his father was long absent or deceased.⁸² Martha Randall remarried Henry J. Bruce on 6 August 1865,⁸³ but died of tuberculosis just six months later.⁸⁴ Characteristically, as with some of the other Randalls, Albert cannot be located in either the Massachusetts 1880 or 1900 censuses. Thirteen years a widower by 1910,⁸⁵ he then resided at the Chelsea Soldiers Home.⁸⁶ For that census entry, he indicated that his father was born in New Hampshire, information reiterated on his death certificate of 8 December 1915, but without a specific town named.⁸⁷ Albert Randall's Civil War pension file sheds no further light on his parents.⁸⁸ In contemplating whether all these pieces of the Randall puzzle fit together, it must be remembered that the woman born Lucy Randall in Eliot, Maine, is the common denominator of time, place, and connection among all these families.

Reading accounts of the Canterbury Shakers, contemporary to when Lucy's relatives lived there, made one isolated piece of information from a Shaker detractor assume much greater significance:

I am knowing to several instances of cruel treatment; Peter Foster commanded a boy, Nathaniel Aikerman, not to leave the shop; the boy left; was gone about fifteen minutes. After the boy returned, Foster seized him, and whipped him with a horsewhip till he broke it up about him; he struck him nearly twenty times. . . .⁸⁹

Peter Foster, a member of the same "North Family" as Lucy Miller, had the opportunity for rebuttal: "I knew a boy there by the name of Nathaniel Aikerman; he was under my care; I never whipped that boy with a whip. . . ."⁹⁰ Nathaniel, described here, was the father of Nathaniel H. Akerman Jr., the child living with Lucy Hall in 1870. As an eight-year-old orphan, he joined Canterbury in 1832, left four years later,⁹¹ and by 1855 had settled in Boston.⁹² There has to be a reason why Nathaniel Jr., of all the fatherless children in Boston, made his way to Lucy's door, even though she no longer lived in Boston. Kinship networks, extending beyond blood relatives, were as much a part of Lucy's society as they are of our own.

Altogether, Lucy (Randall) (Miller) (Marshall) Hall's long life gives us a fascinating glimpse into the world of struggling families, complex households, evangelical piety, and migratory paths from Maine to Boston in the early nineteenth century. Her three marriages were performed by ordained ministers, an indication that she valued church association, as did several members of her extended family. One wonders if she ultimately construed Rev. Silas Hall was a bigamist, and if, as the year 1870 drew to a close, whether Silas Hall left her, or if she asked him to leave. As one would anticipate, Lucy spent her last days with her youngest daughter, Emma (Marshall) Caswell, and family. The 1877 Boston Directory has Lucy T. Hall, widow, boarding at 187 Bunker Hill, Charlestown, and this address also corresponds to her son-in-law, Horace Caswell, painter.⁹³ Although Lucy is not listed with the Caswells in the 1880 census, there is little doubt that she moved. By 1881 Horace Caswell had relocated around the block to 10 Lincoln Street, where Lucy is also listed in the 1882 Boston Directory,⁹⁴ and that is where Lucy died.⁹⁵ She is buried in the Marshall/Caswell family plot in Wildwood Cemetery in Wilmington.⁹⁶ How appropriate that a daughter of a Revolutionary War soldier would live the concluding chapter of her life within sight of the Bunker Hill Monument, and like America itself, descendants of that soldier had ventured "from sea to shining sea."

GENEALOGICAL SUMMARY

EDWARD RANDALL was born about 1758 on the Isle of Shoals, New Hampshire, probably the son of Paul and Abigail (Tuckerman) Randall.⁹⁷ He died of pleurisy at Boston, Massachusetts, on 23 or 24 December 1810, aged 52 years.⁹⁸ He married at Kittery, Maine, on 2 December 1784, SARAH TUCKER.⁹⁹ Sarah was born about 1760, and died at Portsmouth, New Hampshire, on 26 January

1845, aged 84 years,¹⁰⁰ her parentage not determined. Edward served as a private in the New Hampshire line during the Revolutionary War, enlisting “early in the war” and serving “until the peace,” and was wounded three different times.¹⁰¹ After the war he resided in the part of old Kittery that became Eliot and likely earned his living as a mariner. His death in Boston occurred on board the sloop *Mary* of Kittery.

Holy Bible published by Daniel D. Smith, New York, 1824. There is a gilt inscription on the leather cover of the Bible that reads, "Russell Streeter, Portland, 1825." The marriage and birth entries are written in dip pen and appear to be by the same hand and written in one sitting. On the deaths page, the first five deaths appear to be written in the same hand and at one sitting, but the remaining entries seem to have been added at a later date by at least two different hands.

The following genealogical summary contains additional information about the family of Rev. Russell Streeter, whose family Bible record is copied above.

Rev. **RUSSELL STREETER** was born in Chesterfield, New Hampshire, on 15 April 1791, son of Barzillai and Nancy (Brown) Streeter.¹ Having outlived both of his wives, he died in Woodstock, Vermont, of “old age” on 15 February 1880, aged 89 years, 10 months, his death record describing him as a “clergyman.”² He married first in Swanzey, New Hampshire, on 22 October 1812, CLARINDA COOK.³ She was born in Swanzey on 9 July 1794 or 1795, daughter of Simeon and Rhoda (Mann) Cook of Swanzey,⁴ and died in Portland, Maine, on 27 December 1824, aged 30 years.⁵ Russell married second at Portland, on 27 November 1825, FAUSTINA COOK.⁶ Faustina was born in Swanzey on 21 September 1804, daughter of Simeon and Rhoda (Mann) Cook and sister of Clarinda.⁷ She died in Woodstock, Vermont, on 4 December 1861, aged 57 years, 2 months, 13 days.⁸

When Russell Streeter was seven years old, his family moved from Chesterfield to the adjoining town of Swanzey, New Hampshire. At age thirteen, he attended a revival among the Freewill Baptists of Richmond, New Hampshire, and embraced the doctrine of Universalism.⁹ He decided to become a preacher, taking up study to that end, and in September 1810 he received fellowship at the General Convention which met in Langdon, New Hampshire. He began his preaching career in Westminster, Vermont, that same year. From then until 1821, he preached in various places in New Hampshire and Vermont. In January 1821 he was invited to preach at Portland, Maine, and in March organized the first Universalist society there. In 1823 he started publication of the *Christian Intelligencer*, a semimonthly periodical of which he was editor for five years. He served for eight years in Portland, then settled in Watertown, Massachusetts, and in 1829 moved to Shirley, Massachusetts. In 1834 he moved to Woodstock, Vermont, where he lived for thirteen years. He returned to Portland in 1847 and stayed seven additional years before returning to Woodstock, remaining there the rest of his life.¹⁰

described as a widower on his death certificate, although he was listed as single in census records through 1910 (not found in 1920 census).

- iii SEBASTIAN RUSSELL STREETER, b. Springfield, Vt., 1 June 1818, d. Woodstock, Vt., 7 or 8 June 1871, aged 53 years, 9 days;²⁴ m. AGNES M. —. He graduated from Norwich University in Vt. in 1837. He studied law with Tracy & Converse in Woodstock and was admitted to the Windsor Co. Bar in May 1841. He practiced law in Barnard, Vt., 1841–49; Providence, R.I., 1849–60; and Roxbury, Mass., 1860–70. He was commissioned 1st lieutenant of the 61st Mass. Volunteers on 17 Oct. 1864 and was promoted to captain in Nov. 1864, resigning 4 Jan. 1865.²⁵ He evidently lived in Wisc. for a few years, as in the 1860 census S. R. Streeter, aged 42 years, lawyer, b. Vt., was enumerated in Milwaukee, Wisc., with his wife, Agnes M., aged 37 years, b. Vt., and their 4-year old daughter, Caroline, who was b. in Wisc.²⁶ In 1870 Callie S. “Mellish,” aged 14, b. Wisc., was living in Woodstock, Vt., in the household of her aunt and uncle Angela and George Mellish.²⁷ Carrie A. “Streeter” was still living with the Mellishes in 1880, aged 24, described as “niece” and music teacher.²⁸ This suggests that Agnes may have died some time in the 1860s. Sebastian has not been located in the 1870 census.

studied medicine with Dr. B. R. Palmer of Woodstock, Vt., and began his own medical practice in Providence, R.I., 1841–42; Shirley, Mass., 1742–45; and Roxbury, Mass., 1846–91. He was an examining physician for the Mass. volunteers during the Civil War and medical examiner for Norfolk Co., Mass. He was a Republican in politics and represented Roxbury in the Mass. legislature.³⁶

THE JONAS RICE AND JOSHUA MOORE FAMILIES OF
GOULDSBORO, MAINE

Related on Paper but Not by Blood or Marriage

In the last issue of *The Maine Genealogist*, I showed that Johnson's *Early Families of Gouldsboro Maine* [EFG] misidentified four children belonging to the Joshua Moore family, placing them instead as children in the Jonas Rice family.¹⁷⁷ I then provided a corrected family summary of the Jonas Rice family. In this second installment, a corrected family summary will be provided for the Joshua Moore family. Since the Joshua Moore family in 1850 was a blended family—including children that were his (Joshua's by his first wife), hers (his second wife Louisa's by her first husband), and theirs (Joshua and Louisa's together)—and both of Louisa's husbands were Moores, it is not obvious by looking at the census which children belonged to which husband. The following table shows all the family members in 1850 along with clarification as to how each one was related to Joshua Moore.

Captain **JOSHUA M. MOORE** was born [calc.] 6 April 1804, his parentage unknown. He died in Gouldsboro on 10 February 1885, aged 80 years, 10 months, 4 days, and was buried with both of his wives in Prospect Harbor Cemetery, Gouldsboro.¹⁷⁹ He married first, say 1835, JOANNE RICHARDSON of Deer Isle, Maine,

who was born about 1800,¹⁸⁰ her parentage unknown. She died on 1 August 1845, aged 45 years.¹⁸¹ Joshua married second, in Gouldsboro on 27 December 1846, LOUISA (BOWDEN) MOORE, widow of Welch Moore (see below).¹⁸² She was born [calc.] August 1808, her parentage unknown, and died on 14 October 1885, aged 77 years, 2 months.¹⁸³ In 1850 Joshua was described as a seaman and was living with his second wife and eight children in Gouldsboro.¹⁸⁴ He served as a Commissioner of Wrecks in Hancock County in 1856. In census records he was described as a farmer in 1860 and 1880 and a master mariner in 1870.¹⁸⁵

THE DESCENDANTS OF NATHAN¹ LORD OF KITTERY AND BERWICK, MAINE

8 ANN² LORD (*Nathan*¹) was born probably at Kittery, say 1678 (assuming marriage at age 20). She died after 28 August 1745 when she was mentioned in her husband's probate record. She married at Dover, New Hampshire, on 28 August 1698, TOBIAS HANSON as his second wife.⁴¹⁴ Tobias, son of Tobias and Elizabeth (Boyce) Hanson,⁴¹⁵ died in Dover before 28 August 1745 when his will was in probate.⁴¹⁶ He had married first Lydia Canney, who was born on 26 August 1673, daughter of Thomas and Sarah (Taylor) Canney.⁴¹⁷

Tobias was the first of his family to espouse the faith of the Society of Friends, as did his children, who appear frequently in the records of the Dover Monthly Meeting. On 4 February 1698/9, Tobias Hanson gave power of attorney to his uncle John Hance of Shrewsbury, New Jersey, as his general agent in East Jersey.⁴¹⁸ In 1711 Tobias provided a surety on the bond of Gershom Downes on the estate of his brother-in-law Thomas Downes.⁴¹⁹ Tobias and Ann Hanson quitclaimed their interest in the homestead of Ann's brother Abraham Lord and nephew William Lord on 3 May 1736.⁴²⁰ Tobias's children by his first wife, Lydia Canney, included Benjamin and Elizabeth.⁴²¹ Tobias's will of 1 June 1742 mentions his wife Ann, sons Tobias, Joseph, and Isaac, and daughters Elizabeth Buckston [by first wife, Lydia Canney], Mercy Varney, and Judith Twombly.⁴²²

Varney deceased, and brother John Varney. Stephen set aside half an acre of land as a family burying ground, noting that two children were already buried there.⁴²⁵

9 **BENJAMIN² LORD** (*Nathan*¹) was probably born before 1685.⁴⁶⁰ He died in Berwick before 18 February 1745/6 when his will was probated.⁴⁶¹ He married in Kittery, on 10 January 1709/10, PATIENCE NASON.⁴⁶² Patience was born on 10 November 1693,⁴⁶³ daughter of Benjamin and Martha (Canney) Nason,⁴⁶⁴ and died in Berwick after 18 February 1744/5 when Benjamin's will was probated.

On 6 May 1707 Benjamin's mother, Martha Lord, gave "her son, his heirs, executors, and assignees for ever" eighty acres of land in Kittery on the north side of Sturgeon Creek, being part of a tract of land originally granted to Abraham Conley.⁴⁶⁵ By the end of the year Benjamin had sold it in two parcels, to John Morrell and Andrew Neal.⁴⁶⁶ On 19 April 1709, just prior to Benjamin's marriage, his mother, Martha Lord, turned over her homestead, known by the name of Mount Misery, to Benjamin for her maintenance. This time she noted that "said Benjamin Lord Shall at all times behave himself very dutifully and peaceably toward his Mother the said Martha Lord," and if not then she would have "full power and liberty to Reenter upon and possess the

premises and every part thereof in the same tenure as before the signing.”⁴⁶⁷ On 24 April 1725 Benjamin Lord appeared in court in a case involving a counterfeit fifteen-shilling bill. After John Neale appeared and made oath that he received the bill from Benjamin Lord, Benjamin testified that he received the bill from John Hooper.⁴⁶⁸ In 1735 Benjamin began purchasing the estate of his deceased brother Abraham, which for a short time was owned by Abraham’s son William. These deeds, outlined above, are important in establishing Benjamin’s siblings and their heirs.

Benjamin and Patience were married for twenty-five years before any of their children were brought for baptism. On 10 November 1736, “Benj. Lords three children [*blank*], Margery & Lydia by virtue of their mother Patience Lords owning the Cov[enan]t on ye Sabbath who was baptized herself and her daughter Sarah at that time.”⁴⁶⁹ It is possible that the child whose name was left blank refers to the Elizabeth Lord of Berwick who was in court for fornication on 4 April 1727.⁴⁷⁰ As discussed previously, none of the third-generation Lord sons of Nathan² baptized a daughter named Elizabeth, and she could not be reasonably placed as any of their daughters. Assuming Elizabeth was in the range of 15 to 25 years old when she was presented at court, this would place her birth sometime between 1702 and 1712. Benjamin and Patience were married in 1710, and Elizabeth therefore could be their eldest daughter.

Benjamin dated his will 6 August 1745, describing himself as “very sick and weak, but perfect of mind and memory.” He called for his real estate to be equally divided among his three sons, Benjamin, Samuel, and Elisha [in that order], except for the widow’s third. He referred to his wife Patience and “each and every of my daughters,” but did not provide their names.⁴⁷¹ In 1757 some of Benjamin Lord’s children sold their shares in their father’s estate. Their names were given as Martha, wife of Ezekiel Wentworth, Margaret, wife of James Brackett, Phebe, wife of Thomas Downes, Ann, wife of John James, and Elisha Lord, deceased.⁴⁷²

Descendants of Nathan Lord gives Benjamin's wives as (1) Patience Abbott and
 (2) Love Abbott, whom he says was bp. South Berwick, 8 Aug. 1756. It goes on to
 say that by his 1st wife (presumably Patience Abbott), he had Lucy, Benjamin,
 Humphrey, Richard, Patience, Lydia, and one other. The entry then skips to Ben-
 jamin⁴ Lord (*Benjamin*³⁻², *Nathan*¹) whom the compiler notes m. Sarah Chadbourne
 and had children Jacob, Benjamin, Ichabod, Elisha, Patience, Lydia, Mary, Love,
 Bridget, and Hannah. The entry is rather hopelessly garbled, confusing father with
 son, and perhaps confusing Benjamin with his cousin William Lord, who did marry
 a Patience Abbott. No baptism on 8 Aug. 1756 for Love Abbott appears in the
 church records, who at any rate was already married to Benjamin Lord by 1751.
 Lord goes on to note that this Benjamin "is the subject of much genealogical per-
 plexity," and then refers the reader to Stackpole.⁴⁸⁵

There is no evidence of a wife named Patience for Benjamin Jr. and no Love Abbott
 could be discovered. However, the name *Love* is relatively rare. An examination of the
 early Berwick records yielded a possible candidate, Love Goodwin, daughter of Eliza-
 beth Goodwin, singlewoman, who was bp. Berwick, 21 March 1724/5, upon confess-

ing her sin of fornication.⁴⁸⁶ Elizabeth Goodwin made oath that Thomas Butler Jr. was the father of her child. Born in 1723,⁴⁸⁷ Love Goodwin would have been the right age to marry Benjamin Lord, who married his 1st wife, Elizabeth, about 1740. There is no evidence that Love Goodwin died or married another man. The Lords had extensive relationships with the Goodwins. Benjamin's sister Eunice married Thomas Goodwin, while Thomas Goodwin's sister Mary married Richard Lord Jr.

Benjamin's will of 16 June 1788 mentions his wife Sarah, sons Humphrey, Jacob, Benjamin, Ichabod, and Elisha, and daughters Patience wife of John Brown, Mary wife of Jedidiah Downes, Love who was unmarried, Hannah wife of Josiah Brown, and his granddaughter Dorcas Lord, whom he raised in his own home. The children not mentioned in the will included Lucy, Richard, Lydia, and Bridget.

Berwick, 17 Aug. 1769, Mehitable Goodwin,⁵⁴⁰ bp. Berwick, 12 Jan. 1743/4, daughter of Adam and Mehitable (Thompson) Goodwin,⁵⁴¹ d. Lebanon, 20 April 1817.⁵⁴² Eunice Goodwin owned the Covenant at the Berwick 1st Church, 18 Oct. 1767. On 4 April 1773, "Mehitabel Goodwin, [the 3rd] wife of Thomas Goodwin, desiring admission to a state of full Communion [in the Berwick 2nd Church], and she being confined with sickness and apprehended near her end, her desire being made known to the church, it was voted to receive her upon her making profession of her faith."⁵⁴³ Two days later, on 6 April 1773, Eunice, Moses, and Thomas, children of Thomas and Mehitable Goodwin, were baptized. Apparently Mehitable recovered from her illness, as on 4 April 1775 Mehitable, daughter of Thomas and Mehitable Goodwin, was baptized. On 1 Oct. 1776 Eunice's brother Benjamin Lord and his wife offered for baptism Reuben, the son of Thomas Goodwin. On 6 July 1779 Ephraim, son of Thomas and Mehitable Goodwin, was baptized, followed by Gideon on 12 Sept. 1781.⁵⁴⁴
